



Habitat Dane Continues its Partnership with El Salvador

Twelve individuals built a home and partnered with a family in a Habitat Dane Global Village Trip to El Salvador in February, 2014. Habitat Dane will return to El Salvador twice in 2015. The first trip will be from March 28 to April 5 and the second trip is with the UW-Madison Student Chapter from May 23 to May 31.

Twelve El Salvador families will become homeowners in the next three years thanks to the efforts of Habitat Dane, which will provide Habitat El Salvador \$28,000 per year for three fiscal years starting in fiscal year 2013.

All New Habitat Homes Designated as Green Built Certified

Green Built Home™, in partnership with the Madison Area Builders Association, has certified that all new Habitat for Humanity of Dane County homes are Green Built Homes. Since 2005, all new Habitat Dane homes earned at least 112 points in the Green Built Home rating system, far exceeding the 60 points required for basic certification. The homes also comply with Energy Star® standards.

"Green building saves homeowners money in the long term through reduced energy," said Nathan Engstrom, Green Built Home program director.

Two recent Fitchburg homes scored a 52 on the HERS index. A new Wisconsin home generally scores 100 and a net zero energy home, the most efficient, scores 0.

"You (Habitat) should be quite pleased with the overall tightness of the homes," said Laura Paprocki, Trinity Environmental Engineers. "You're getting down to the overall tightness level of a performance builder. Nice job!"

Paprocki added that because the home reached the \$1,000 reward level - which gets doubled because it's an affordable home, Focus on Energy will mail Habitat a check for \$2,000 for our efforts.

From the ReStore they purchased: insulation for the floor, plywood for the subfloor, plastic, copper and PEX plumbing, main electrical panel and garage subpanel. They also purchased outlet boxes, light fixtures, a bath fan, shower fixtures, tile and windows from the free bin.
